Scripture Memory: Habakkuk 2:9

“Woe to him that coveteth an evil covetousness to his house, that he may set his nest on high,
that he may be delivered from the power of evil!”

In Habakkuk 2:9, what sin caused God to pronounce judgment upon the Babylonians?

Discussion: What is the motivation for coveting?

The Babylonians were guilty of the sin of coveting.

Read the Ten Commandments in Exodus 20:1-17. How is the tenth commandment unique or different from the others? Discussion: Why does this sin get so little attention?

The tenth commandment, “thou shalt not covet,” deals with our inward heart of motivations and desires rather than our outward actions.

According to Hebrews 13:5-6, how is it possible that we can be content at all times? How will this look for us practically?

We must realize that God is with us and will never leave us nor forsake us.

According to Philippians 4:11 how did Paul come to be content? How do we learn this?

Paul said he learned to be content.

In Colossians 3:5 covetousness is called what? Discussion: Why does God say this?

One of the most important things to understand is that covetousness is idolatry and therefore we worship what we covet.

According to I Timothy 6:6, what is great gain? Why do you believe these two things must go together?

God says that "godliness with contentment is great gain."

What great warning was given by the Lord Jesus in Luke 12:15-20? Discussion: Why do so many people measure their life by what they possess on earth?

Jesus warns us to beware of covetousness because our life does not consist of the abundance of our possessions.

What do some people trust in according to Psalm 20:7? Why is this foolish?

The Scripture says that some trust in chariots and horses rather than the Lord.
